Artificial intelligence (AI) is transforming many fields, and education is no exception. From personalized learning to automating administrative tasks, AI is making inroads into schools and universities.

What exactly is AI? Simply put, it is technology that mimics human intelligence. AI systems can analyze data, recognize patterns, and make decisions or predictions. This enables computers to perform tasks like understanding speech, identifying images, recommending content, and more.

In education, AI can support both teachers and students. It can assess students' strengths and weaknesses to design customized lesson plans. Chatbots act as digital tutors that provide extra support outside the classroom. And AI can automate tedious processes like grading, creating rubrics, or writing newsletters, freeing up teachers' time.

Of course, AI has limitations and raises concerns. Educators worry it may replace human roles and interactions. But if implemented thoughtfully, AI can enhance rather than replace traditional teaching. It gives teachers more insight into each student's needs. Interest in classroom AI is rapidly rising. As this technology evolves, we'll continue exploring the right balance of human teachers and artificial intelligence.

Staying Safe Online

Key Takeaways for Educators

During our November 6th meeting, Steven Hoyle, the Chief Technology Officer for Lincoln County Schools gave a presentation on cybersecurity that contained valuable insights for educators. The core message was that we all need to be more vigilant about protecting ourselves and our students online.

The presentation focused on the prevalence of cyber threats today. For example, every 39 seconds a cyber attack targets a business. Ransomware attacks on schools worldwide grew over 800% last year. The average cost of a data breach now exceeds \$4 million.

To guard against these threats, Mr. Hoyle emphasized training and education around cybersecurity best practices. Simple mistakes like reusing passwords and clicking on suspicious links are behind most data breaches. Ongoing cybersecurity awareness campaigns are essential.

For educators specifically, be wary of social engineering tactics that try to manipulate you into sharing private information or clicking on malware links. Phishing emails impersonating parents or colleagues are a common example. Verify identities before sharing student or employee data.

When it comes to students' online safety, monitor their social media activity and educate them about predators disguising themselves online. One shocking stat: 500,000 predators target minors across platforms every day.

Other key cybersecurity tips for educators:

- Use secure payments and vet vendors carefully.
- Don't open attachments from unknown senders.
- Set social media privacy settings to high.
- Initiate contact yourself rather than trusting unsolicited messages.

By increasing our cybersecurity knowledge and vigilance, we can better protect our students and schools from the growing threat of cyber attacks. Small habit changes will go a long way.

Key Cybersecurity Terms

- Phishing Phony emails, texts or websites impersonating trusted sources to trick people into sharing login credentials, credit card info or other sensitive data.
- **Malware** Malicious software installed on a device, often through phishing, that can damage systems, steal data, or allow hackers to access networks. Examples include viruses, worms, trojans, and spyware.
- Ransomware A type of malware that encrypts important files on a system until the victim pays a ransom, usually in cryptocurrency.

Her heartfelt presentation took audience members on a moving journey of courage perseverance. Alona's love of teaching and desire to be the best teacher she can be was evident from an early age. She plans to connect research in second-language writing education and bring innovative teaching methods back to Ukraine.

Members celebrated the customs of the Gila River Indian Community and the diversity of DKG as they played bingo, watched dancers, ate native cuisine, participated in breakout sessions, listened to guest speakers, and enjoyed the fellowship of others.

ED LAW & POLICY 2023 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS from Committee Chair Heather Myers

HS GRADUATION & CREDIT

- All MS/HS students must have a career development plan & career portfolio (2024-2025)
- Computer Science added as a graduation requirement (art added a couple years ago)
- Three year graduation plan requirement (effective for current 10th graders to graduate 24-25)
 - Must declare and cannot participate in ANY school services
 - Means potential 16 year olds graduating
 - Unknown impact on college acceptance

LEGAL BITS

- Unpaid meal debts cannot be used to withhold any student records or graduation
- Three-cuing system or visual memory for literacy in K-3 is probited by law
- Criminal penalties for not reporting major school employee misconduct
- Requires conflict of interest training for contract approving personnel

PARENT BILL OF RIGHTS

Updates:

- · Parent Bill of Rights -- not in force until 1st day of school AFTER January 1st.
- State Board narrowly defines its areas for review (pronoun/name changes & health services not book challenges) & schools pay \$200 per hr. legal fee regardless of outcome
- · Parent consent not needed for emergencies

Major Components:

- Communication & Parent Involvement Requirements (ex. pronouns, surveys, medical)
- Instructional materials challenge procedures for school then BOE then State
- No gender identity or sexuality instruction K-3

SHOW ME THE MONEY!

- Raises 3% 10% w/ focus on beginning teacher salary (\$36,000 to \$41,0000) new master's pay not reinstated
- Raises average 7% for principals & non-certified personally + 2% more for bus drivers
- APs Teacher step + 19%
- \$ Allocated to TA Tuition Reimbursement Grant Program (\$4600 per year per TA)
- \$ Allocated to Teacher Apprentice Grant Program for tuition & salary supplements for "eligible teacher apprecentices" employed in an elementary school in same LEA they graduated from
- More \$ for NCCAT & NC Teaching Fellows Program (STEM, SPED, & K-6 Teachers)
- \$ Allocated for Salary Supplements for Advanced Teaching Roles (\$10,000 or \$3,000)
- \$ Allocated to signing bonuses for small county & low-wealth counties
- More \$ Allocated to Opportunity Scholarship Program
- \$ Allocated for local monument for Benjamin Lincoln because of PBL Lesson @ ELHS
