An international outbreak of coronavirus (COVID-19) has caused statewide stay-at-home orders from the governor, causing the indefinite postponement of the convention and other gatherings.

If you had registered but have not heard from the hotel, call 1-800-Embassy to verify the cancellation. They did not have emails for everyone. Individual registrations for the convention are still intact, though. Members who have registered should have received an email from NC DKG Treasurer Leslie Black verifying their registration. Once the convention is rescheduled, new registrations will be open without a late fee until one week before the new date. Updates will be posted on the NC DKG website and social media when decisions are made.

Rising Star

The NC DKG, Rising Star Award, is intended to recognize and encourage key women educators in their early years of active membership in N.C. Delta Kappa Gamma. These members demonstrate exceptional growth in education, leadership, and contributions to the organization consistent with our Vision and Purposes. Rising Star nominees reflect the strong potential for successful leadership at the chapter and state levels and beyond.

Delta Sigma has nominated Shelia Wright as our Rising Star Nominee. Shelia has earned her Master's in Reading Education and her add-on in Masters in School Administration and Curriculum and Instruction from UNCC. She has received her certification as a See Saw Ambassador, NEWSELA Certified Teacher, EPIC Master Teacher, Prodigy Ambassador, and Brain Pop Educator. Her professional achievements are outstanding.

Shelia has been instrumental in working with Delta Sigma's Beginning Teacher Committee for several years. She has diligently worked to secure gift items for our first- and second-year teachers for each quarter since she has been inducted to Delta Sigma in 2017. She has organized a panel of teachers to serve as guest presenters to our first- and second-year teachers at an afterschool meeting hosted by the school district. The panel offers words of wisdom and lessons learned from Delta Sigma chapter members from elementary through high school. This session has become an annual event with the school district's beginning teacher program, and Delta Sigma is consistently requested to assist with this panel discussion based on the quality of panel members and information they provide. Shelia's work with these efforts have provided great leadership to this committee and our work with beginning teachers.

Besides her leadership in the classroom and in the school where she serves as assistant principal, Shelia co-coaches the Elementary Battle of the

Books team. This school has a long legacy of having well-prepared teams for competition that really know and understand the books on the assigned reading list and can provide plenty of supporting evidence to the answers they provide. This role requires numerous after school hours with students from the beginning of the year until March, annually. Shelia has also served as a lead teacher for the school district's summer reading camps where she organized materials for teachers, created testing groups, as well as monitored student portfolios to ensure student achievement was properly documented. Her leadership in this area has been a tremendous help to the district and students. In the community, Shelia has served as a Relay for Life team captain. She coordinated Relay for Life fundraisers for her school and helped raise over \$3000. Shelia is a two-time Breast Cancer Survivor! She has a passion for finding a cure for cancer and building awareness in the community.

Elaine has served on and chaired the Program and Fine Arts Committee as well as the Education Law and Policy Committee. She has been instrumental in advocating for public education by keeping members informed of current legislative issues and their potential impact. Elaine has taken an active role in all nine Delta Sigma Fashion Show fundraisers, working in the kitchen, and also modeling for the show. The monies from these fundraisers support scholarships for local high school seniors who plan to enter the field of education and support Lincoln County Schools' beginning teachers. She has also been a leader in Delta Sigma's efforts to support beginning teachers. For many years, Delta Sigma members adopted individual beginning teachers though the chapter's THAT (Teachers Helping Another Teacher) program to provide encouragement and support. 
