Speak Up For Children

The **Delta Sigma** chapter of **Delta Kappa Gamma Society International** held its fall meeting on Thursday, November 14th, at Boger City United Methodist Church in Lincolnton.

Elaine Boysworth greeted members and shared excerpts of a Thanksgiving essay written by Alex Haley and provided the invocation. The meeting was hosted by the members of the Publicity and Communication Committee. Jill Eaddy introduced the two speakers for the evening – Sandy Kennedy and Charlie Bohlen. The program highlighted foster care in Lincoln County, along with the services of Speak Up For Children.

Kennedy. Some of those investigations result in removal from the home and placement into foster care. By sharing anonymous case studies, she highlighted possible outcomes for foster children from adoption to reunification with parents. In October 2019, twelve children were released from DSS custody. Five cases resulted in reunification with parents; three children were adopted, and in four cases, guardianship was awarded.

Charlie Bohlen, a former educator in New York and North Carolina, shared information about the Guardian ad Litem Program. The program utilizes trained volunteers and was established by the NC statute in 1983. Each child in DSS custody is provided a Guardian ad Litem

(GAL) who serves, along with an attorney advocate to provide team representation for a child in trial and appellate proceedings. In Lincoln County, there are approximately 33 trained Guardians ad Litem. Lincoln County GALs may advocate for over 100 children at any one time. These children often have many unmet needs, such as clothes, shoes, and assistance with school-related activities and additional opportunities that are available to other children. As a result, the GALs in Lincoln County organized Speak Up For Children (SUFC). This organization is a non-profit 501(c)(3)organization that raises funds and solicits in-kind donations to provide opportunities and fill unmet material needs for the children they serve, thus providing hope and a sense of normalcy in their disrupted lives. SUFC also supports the Guardian

ad Litem program by assisting in volunteer recruitment and on-going training.

During the holiday season, Speak Up For Children sponsored the 2019 Holiday Tour of Homes. Proceeds from this event are used to benefit the foster children of Lincoln County. Mr. Bohlen encouraged members of **Delta Sigma** to continue their active support for this fundraiser. The tour was held on Friday, December 13th, 2019, form 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The tour offered the opportunity to enter some of Lincolnton's most beautiful private homes and a historic church, all decorated for the holidays.

Tour of Homes Success

Delta Sigma members volunteered to assist at the 2019 Holiday Tour of Homes fundraiser sponsored by Speak Up for Children in December. Volunteers assisted by checking tickets and serving as hostesses in various rooms at tour sites. The tour offered the opportunity for community members to visit several beautiful, magnificent homes and First United Methodist Church Some homes featured remarkable architecture and stunningly handcrafted furniture pieces. Each site had its unique qualities



that amazed all.

The participants were all extremely appreciative of the homeowners for graciously opening up their homes to so many visitors. These homeowners took time

Twenty **Delta Sigma** members participated in the Tour of Homes totaling 80+ volunteer hours. Our volunteers served as hostesses in the homes and assisted folks who were touring. Funds from this event are used to pay for tutoring, special events like birthday parties or prom, sports equipment and registration fees, clothing, camp, amusement park fees and any other activities that will help bring normalcy to foster children's lives.

Thank you members who volunteered and for members who bought tickets for this event. This was one of **Delta Sigma**'s community service projects and benefited the children in foster care in Lincoln County. It was definitely a win-win project!



Delta Sigma Chapter Focuses on Service and Fellowship

At the January 27th meeting, members spent time together focusing on service and fun. Kennan Eaddy welcomed members and Lincolnton City Councilman Dr. Martin Eaddy to the meeting hosted by the Program and Fine Arts Committee. The invocation was provided by Jill Eaddy. Kennan reminded all members of the upcoming fashion show fundraiser to be held on April 4th, 2020. She asked each member to sign up for a role in making the fashion show success to support the chapter's efforts in providing scholarships for future educators.

Delta Sigma member Kristen Reynolds shared her experiences in Uganda while on a mission trip. She shared some alarming statistics regarding unschooled children. Over 262 million children and youth worldwide are uneducated.

Approximately 57 million of those are elementary children, and 50% of those children live in sub-Saharan Africa, where only 83 girls are enrolled in school for every 100 boys. There are numerous reasons for these issues. Schooling is not free in most African countries and communities. Villages also lack educated teachers and facilities. Other factors include disease and even government corruption. Kristen also shared her personal experiences in Uganda with an eight-year-old boy named Moses.

As she shared his picture, Kristen described Moses as a village boy who loved soccer. He was not part of the orphanage that the mission group served, but he asked to stay if he would help translate for the children in the orphanage. Moses was unable to go to school because his mother was a single parent, and he didn't have anyone who could pay his school fees. Unfortunately, there was not a way to sponsor him or pay his school fees. The best gift the group could offer Moses was a new soccer ball. Kristen indicated she did not know if Moses ever got to go to school, but thought it was likely he did not. Kristen shared that she would never forget his face, his compassion, and the thought that children like him around the world don't have the same opportunities as our children. Her prayer for Moses has been that, just as his name's sake, he was delivered to a life outside of poverty and disease and hopefully obtained an education that has led him to be able to provide for his family. Children like Moses are why we help and support Schools for Africa.

In 2010, Schools for Africa became the first international project of **Delta Kappa Gamma Society International**. The project serves 13 African countries and involves providing access to quality basic education for children with a primary focus on girls, orphans, and those most vulnerable. Within these countries and communities, UNICEF works to help communities participate in school management; build schools and classrooms; create environments where students can play and learn safely; provide clean water and sanitation facilities that are separate for boys and girls; supply furniture and items for daily school lessons; train teachers;

educate about hygiene, HIV, and other communicable diseases; and provide interventions such as health check-ups, immunizations, and scholarships. To raise funds for this worthy project, Kristen



offered several items from her most recent trip to be purchased for a donation to Schools for Africa. **Delta Sigma** members showed tremendous support by collecting \$438.00 for the Schools for Africa project.

The fun and fellowship began when Jill Eaddy introduced Beth Wise, a former Lincoln

County Schools teacher. Beth shared how she got her start in cake baking and making cakes for a variety of occasions. She has provided several adult classes about cupcake designs and has even



instructed at a cupcake camp, teaching her expert skills to others. She demonstrated how to create icing bags with baggies and icing tips and how to properly hold the icing bag to get the best position for decorating a

cupcake.

Following Beth's instructions, each member created multiple cupcakes. Some decorated with flowers; others created unicorn cupcakes. The activity was challenging, but members had fun creating the cupcakes together and enjoyed the time to fellowship. Cupcakes were placed in a plastic cup

and wrapped for delivery to Amy's House, a local shelter for

women designed to provide a safe haven for families displaced by domestic violence. **Delta Sigma** members hoped to bring a little sweet treat to the women and children housed at Amy's house.

Hall Guest Speaker at February Meeting of Women Educators

The Finance Committee sponsored the meeting on February 13th, Wendy Mosteller welcomed members to the meeting and provided the invocation.

President Rhonda Hager introduced the guest speaker, John Hall, who serves as the Executive Director of Hesed House of Hope, a community shelter for the homeless in Lincolnton. Hall shared the history of Hesed House, indicating the shelter first opened in 2008 and rotated between five churches for the winter season. Through the work of many local churches, organizations, and volunteers, a permanent shelter was built and opened in 2012 as a wintertime shelter. The shelter began to remain open all year long in 2018 through continued community support and partnerships. Currently, the shelter is expanding to add two family rooms with eight more beds.

Hesed House is a non-profit organization and is currently the only homeless shelter in Lincoln



County. The goal of Hesed House is to provide temporary housing and food, allowing individuals to regroup and get back on their feet. Hall stated that the philosophy of this faithbased organization is to provide a hand up, not a handout. Assistance is provided to help clients with housing and in their search for employment. Clients also attend classes on various topics, including

health education, CPR/First Aid, and finance. Hesed House provides Jobs for Life training, a 16week program that teaches the value of work and many of the "soft" skills needed in the workplace. Hall shared several heartwarming stories of individuals and families who have benefited from the services provided by Hesed House. After the presentation, members of **Delta Sigma** donated funds to help support the work of the shelter.

Before the business portion meeting, President Hager recognized **Delta Sigma** members with ten or fewer years of membership in DKG and highlighted the contributions of each individual to



the chapter and DKG. President Hager also stressed the responsibilities of all members for the upcoming fashion show fundraiser. This vear's fashion show will be held on Saturday, April 4th, 2020, at the First Methodist Church Fellowship Hall in

Food preparation will be led by Jill Eaddy, Becky Heavner, and Elaine Boysworth. Wanda Lutz will be managing the distribution of tickets and collection of money for the show assisted by Melissa Dellinger. Please support these members if your assistance is requested. It will take all of us working together to make this show successful!

Show tickets were distributed to members at the February 13th meeting. Money must be returned on Friday, March 20th, using a drive-through at Boger City Methodist Church. We will be at the church from 3:00–5:00 p.m. that day. This will give you a month and a half to sell, sell, sell! If anyone has trouble bringing their money at that time, please

contact Wanda, Rhonda, or Kennan and we will make plans to get it. Guest tickets are \$15.00 each. The executive board voted to keep the price of member tickets at \$10.00 each.
