

Delta Sigma Hold Virtual Meetings in 2021







Members of the Delta Sigma met virtually in January and February, 2021. The January 25th meeting was hosted by the Program and Fine Arts Committee. President Kennan

Eaddy opened the meeting with a poem titled "I'm So Much More Than a Teacher." Kelton Boorman led an icebreaker activity. In breakout groups, members were asked to determine a personal resolution and a school resolution for their group. Common themes shared by all the groups included health, journaling, and mindfulness as personal goals. Educational resolutions included being more engaging and innovative, being the best versions of ourselves, being present, balancing personal and professional life, and having grace above all.



Sherry Hoyle led a program on Self-Care. Members were asked to complete a "Bubble Map" and include things that they could not imagine life without. Members shared items from

their maps that ranged from family, church, and friends to exercise and Netflix (especially during this pandemic). After sharing a Self-Care Wheel that included the areas of Physical, Psychological, Personal, Spiritual, Professional, and Emotional, Sherry discussed how all the items members presented could be categorized into these six areas. Sherry also noted the importance of taking time for yourself and encouraged

everyone to set two goals for focusing on self-care during the month of February.

The program was presented by Elaine Jenkins and informed members of a new non-profit organization in Lincoln County – Outside Chance Mentorships (OCM).

OCM is a non-profit

organization co-founded by Delta Sigma President Kennan Eaddy and her business partner Josh Henderson. The goal of Outside Chance Mentorships (OCM) is to pair mentoring opportunities with family support. Through this pairing of relationships, OCM will support students who lack experiences that nurture their potential and also assist parents who lack the knowledge and/or confidence to use the proper channels in the school

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system. OCM will endeavor to keep students from "falling through the cracks" by building supportive relationships with students and their families. Jenkins shared how the program works including student selection, vetting of mentors, matching students with mentors, time mentors will invest in the traditional mentor role, and additional responsibilities to support families. Jenkins also commented on how clearly mentor duties and non-duties were delineated. In addition, mentor training is required and support for mentors is built into the design of the program. Costs and funding of the program along with opportunities for community support were also discussed. For more information on Outside Chance Mentorships, see page 4.

In December of 2019, I recognized a need for students and families in Lincoln County along with my business partner, Josh Henderson. We were

daily interacting with families who wanted to help their students in school but didn't know what to do, what questions to ask. While every school has employees who reach out to families and do their best to help, the need is simply too large and too constant for us to handle while also performing all our other duties as assigned. We felt that Lincoln County would benefit from an organization that worked with families, community members, and the school system to meet this need. After six months of research and extra professional development, we established Outside Chance Mentorships, Inc.

Outside Chance identifies potential in select public school students, creating intentional partnerships with invested mentors who provide early enrichment and support through empowering relationships and experiences while assisting families in navigating the educational system. Mentors and parents work together with school staff to support students' academic and emotional growth. In public schools, seemingly "average" students often do not receive the individualized attention and support that could help push them to a new level of success. With the increased demand on schools and teachers, these students, who are filled with untapped potential, can easily fall through the cracks. It is left up to chance for them to succeed without the attention that high-flying and struggling students require. Outside Chance was designed to purposefully support this group of students and their families, taking their futures outside of chance. By building partnerships with community members and training the general public on current issues and evolving school processes, we aim to increase community support for schools, students, families.

Josh and I serve as Co-Executive Directors, in charge of day-to-day planning and operations. Additionally we have an amazing Board of Directors helping us making decisions including Delta Sigma members Elaine Jenkins and Rhonda Hager, serving as President and Treasurer respectively. Covid-19 has delayed us in kicking off mentor experiences, but in some ways has been a blessing. We have had extra time to attend seminars, talk to other programs, and begin marketing and fundraising. We launched a mentor drive on February 15th and have set a date for our first mentormentee Match Day!

Update on Sale of DKG International Headquarters

International President Becky Sadowski recently shared an update on the progress related to the sale of DKG's headquarters building. In a written statement, she said, "Some of you may remember that the decision to move forward with this step was announced in 2019....there are many phases included in this process. We believe transparency is very important, and we also want to make every effort to ensure that our members are not given misinformation."



More specific detail about the work being done was shared in a letter with state organization presidents, such as meetings taking place and

considerations related to the building's present listing on the National Historic Register. The process continues to evolve as the sale of the 60+-year-old building, with rising property taxes and wiring challenges, goes through these first steps.

In late January, DKG leaders along with the buyer's team and the realty advisory group representing DKG, met with the Austin City Planning Commission. After presentations by the Austin Historic Landmark Commission, DKG members and leaders, and the buyer's team, the Commission voted on two critical decisions: the historic designation for the DKG property was denied, and a recommendation for Downtown Mixed Use (DMU) rezoning was approved without any conditional overlays, such as height restrictions.

These decisions clear the way for approval of a demolition permit and hopefully approval of the DMU rezoning by the Austin City Council when the case is heard at its meeting, currently scheduled for February 18. Within the next few months, more information regarding these and other steps will be made available as soon as possible.

The Administrative Board will begin considering potential future sites for a new headquarters in the Austin area as the process moves into the final stages.

At that time, feedback from members and staff will become critical.

President Sadowski stressed the importance of accuracy in discussions and postings on social media. She said, "We want you to be informed and have access to accurate information throughout this process." She encouraged state organization presidents to contact her with questions. Likewise, our state chapter members are encouraged to contact NC DKG President Dr. Teresa H. Cowan with questions or if you would like to read the entire letter for more details about the process.

Taking the Survey Encouraged

International President Becky Sadowski is asking members to take the survey on the DKG website to help guide the decisions about this summer's conferences. She says, "As we move forward with planning for 2021 international conferences, we are offering an opportunity for members to share their thoughts regarding attendance at these DKG events. After members sign-in on the DKG website, they should look in the upper right section of the page to find a survey question that we hope members will complete. The question is longer than usual, so members will need to scroll down on the question to submit their response."

The survey question changes periodically, so if this particular question about the conferences is not still up, please answer the one that is there. All input is valuable to planning and operations.

Out of an abundance of caution for its members, the 2021 NC DKG Convention will be a virtual event but will retain as much of a face-to-face atmosphere as possible.

NC DKG President Dr. Teresa H. Cowan has announced that the 2021 convention will build on the success and learning experience of the Fall Executive Board virtual event that was open to all members and included workshops, presentations, a business session, and recorded and live vignettes. The virtual aspect of the convention will allow more members to participate and an expanded offering of workshops.

Plans are progressing for the 2021 NC DKG virtual convention to be held April 23-25. The theme for the convention will be Celebrating NC DKG: Past, Present, and Future. Workshop presentation applications are being taken now via a Google form.

Registration is now open for members and will be \$25, which will help cover the cost of the virtual platforms, materials, and postage. The first 350 registrants will receive an iconic NC DKG 2020 convention bag. Those who register after April 2 are not guaranteed convention materials (activity packets, convention bling, and more) but will receive links to participate in convention general sessions, business meetings, workshops, voting on officers, and voting on amendments to the By-laws and Standing Rules. These will continue through the weekend and be available later as well.

The actual convention, for which members will need to register, will begin on Friday evening. That event will feature the presentation of the Founders Award.

Celebrating the 'Present' on Saturday

Saturday will kick off at 9:00 a.m. with the Executive Board Meeting. All registered members are invited to participate, but voting will be limited to Executive Board members. Workshops, live and pre-recorded, will be in the afternoon, and the evening session will celebrate the accomplishments of chapters and members, featuring DKG Membership Director Trish Woodley.

Sunday to Celebrate the 'Future'

Sunday's activities will begin at 1:00 p.m. with the annual meeting of the Educational Foundation, followed by the general session featuring the installation of the newly-elected 2021-2023 NC DKG officers and the passing of the gavel.

Knickers for New Life has been chosen by Region XI as the 2021 NC DKG Convention Project. Knickers for New Life (KFNL) partners with schools in Uganda to keep girls in school by providing knickers (underwear), sanitary supplies,



separate latrines, handwash stations, and mosquitorepellant soap. Thousands of girls miss a week of school a month because of the lack of these basic sanitary supplies. The results are lifelong.

Choosing KFNL as the convention project celebrates the 10th anniversary of DKG's partnership with Schools for Africa. Only \$35 will meet the needs of a girl in a Ugandan school for a year, and 100% of the donations to KFNL will go to the non-profit ministry. Learn more at knickersfornewlife.org.

Member Spotlight



Prior to graduating from college, Gayle Reid was well aware of DKG through her work with recreation department summer programs and substitute teaching. She met many DKG members and had the utmost respect for

them. Her roots in DKG run even deeper. Gayle's mother was a principal and served as the first president of a newly formed South Burlington, Vermont chapter.

Gayle has fond memories of all the ladies meeting at her home. After graduating from the University of Vermont in 1977 with a degree in elementary education, Gayle was honored to be invited to join the Beta Chapter of DKG in Vermont in 1982.



In 1983, Gayle completed her Master's degree in Curriculum and Instruction. Gayle vividly recalls completing her oral exam on a snowy Vermont day. During the exam, so much snow had piled up that her car slid into a snowbank as she left campus. She was not injured, but needed help to push her car out of the snowbank. After a group of college guys declined her request for assistance, she politely unbuttoned her coat to reveal her eight month pregnancy and asked, "Do you really think I can do this myself?" Of course, she received the assistance she needed. Gayle knows how to get things done!



Gayle taught at the elementary level for 41 years, 22 of those in Lincoln County. Upon moving to Lincoln County, it took a bit of searching to find a DKG chapter. With the help of International, she found Beta Epsilon. Imagine her surprise when she discovered that

her own principal's wife (Sara Miller) was a member. It never crossed her mind to ask Principal Steve about a DKG chapter! Gayle has also had the pleasure of working with two Delta Sigma members as her principal, Wanda Lutz and Denise Patterson, and she feels she learned so much from both of them.

Describing what DKG meant to her, Gayle used terms like "cream of the crop" and "excellent teachers." She believes teachers can sometimes feel isolated in their

own classrooms, but DKG provides support, socialization, and new ideas. She has always felt well informed and supported by her DKG sisters.

Even as a farmer's wife, full-time educator, mother, and now grandmother, Gayle always made time to stay involved in DKG. She has been a leader, serving as the first president of the newly formed Delta Sigma Chapter. One of Gayle's favorite memories in DKG is serving as regional director. She met wonderful teachers and educators as she visited all chapters in Region X each year. Each chapter was welcoming and had different approaches to DKG meetings, projects, and activities. Yet, every chapter had a focus on the common goals and purposes of DKG. Gayle always enjoyed and learned from these visits.

In 2018, Gayle was the recipient of the Golden Key Award for Region X. NC DKG guidelines indicate "The award is designed to honor members who are in the background getting things done without personal glory or gain for themselves ... members who are the backbone of chapters ... who are the thread that holds the chapter together and have a deep and abiding love for DKG."



Gayle is the embodiment of these guidelines.

For our newest chapter members, Gayle suggests taking the opportunity to attend a state or international conference. "It will provide you with a new perspective... DKG is huge and worldwide, with so many activities that have a great impact."

On a personal note, Gayle loves to sew, knit, crochet, and quilt. She has raised her own food for 45 years, both vegetables and meat. She also enjoys working with her husband in his woodshop. He does all types of woodwork from



cabinetry and furniture to the smaller items he sells at Just Around the Corner such as keepsake boxes, cutting boards, rolling pins, and pens. Most of their children have furnished their homes with pieces made in the workshop. In retirement, Gayle continues to be a very busy lady! With the current school schedule, she keeps her grandchildren several days a week. In addition, she shared at our January Zoom meeting she just completed

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chemotherapy for breast cancer and is feeling well.

When asked about her favorite quote, Gayle <u>first</u> responded, "Grandma, read me a story." She then added that her favorite quote was inscribed on a plaque she received from a family in Vermont when she was moving to NC. She taught all five daughters in this family – the oldest daughter in her first year teaching and the youngest during her last year teaching in Vermont. The quote is by Henry Adams – "A teacher affects eternity; he can never tell where his influence stops."

Through her career and her service as a very active DKG member, Gayle Reid has made a strong impact on families, students, and colleagues in both Vermont and Lincoln County.
