Delta Sigma Scholarship and Award Winners Announced

The work of the Delta Sigma Scholarship Committee, chaired by Judy Shuford, culminated with the announcement of scholarships and awards at the April 28th meeting. Three \$1,000 scholarships were presented to young women planning to enter the field of education, including the Annette Geymont Memorial Future Educator Scholarship for Lincoln County students. This scholarship is awarded in memory of Annette who passed away in 2019. Annette was a charter member of Delta Sigma and touched many lives as a teacher during her thirty year career. The scholarship is provided through the generosity of her family.



The recipient of The Annette Geymont Memorial Future Educator Scholarship was Cailin Marie Walker, daughter of Pastor Chad and Misti Walker of Iron Station, NC. Cailin is a recent graduate of East Lincoln High School and will be attending the

University of North Carolina at Charlotte in the fall. In her application essay, Cailin stated, "Now, more than ever, teachers are not solely their student's educator but their role models, motivators, and the lens through which they first experience new ideas. I am motivated and eager to aid and encourage my future students to succeed on their own journeys of education."

Recipients of two additional Delta Sigma Future Educator Scholarships were Lori Elizabeth Glavan and Elizabeth Ashley Eudy. Lori is the daughter of Bogomir and Rebecca Glavan of Denver, NC and recently graduated from North Lincoln High School. She also plans to attend the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in the fall. Lori shared, "Following the COVID school shutdown, I felt

helpless upon watching student after student struggle through virtual instruction." She jumped at the opportunity to assist students in her community by accepting a position as a YMCA school-aged



counselor. She commented, "As I helped students with their remote learning assignments ... my desire to create a world of motivated, excited learners was ignited. I am eager to connect with students on an even larger scale, in the near future, sparking students' curiosity to learn for their personal betterment."

Elizabeth Eudy, the daughter of Jennifer and the late Jonathan Eudy of Lincolnton, NC is a graduate of Lincolnton High School and plans to attend Western Carolina University. She states in her essay, "My aspiration to be a teacher



began in elementary school, because I had so many amazing teachers growing up...I fulfilled this aspiration by going home, teaching my stuffed animals or Barbie Dolls, and transforming my bedroom into a classroom with the use of my imagination. My third grade teacher knew I wanted to become a teacher, so she gave me leftover worksheets that I pretended to grade." Elizabeth is enthusiastic about becoming a teacher.



Madison Green received The Buzzing BEE (Beginning Educator Excelling) Award. This award is presented to a female beginning teacher who demonstrates a natural gift for teaching. Madison is a mathematics teacher at Lincolnton High School. She

was nominated for the award by her principal, Scott Carpenter who wrote, "There are many things that make Madison a great teacher." Particularly, he has noticed she will not let struggling students fail – she provides assistance before and after school and preteaches her lessons. "When her at-risk students enter her classroom, they have already been acclimated to the lesson. They will join in the conversation and participate in class. Their confidence level has excelled to new heights. It is so exciting to see a former struggling student beam with confidence and most importantly, success."

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

2022 In-Person NC DKG Convention Highlights



Members attending NC DKG's first in-person convention in three years expressed joy in seeing friends and making new ones! DKG President

Becky Sadoski charmed attendees with her open personality. NC DKG President Beth Winsted warmly welcomed everyone with big smiles. Genuine spiritual fellowship abounded!

The 88th NC DKG Convention "Linking the Past Present, and Future . . . Together Again!" was held April 29 – May 1, 2022 at the Asheville Crowne Plaza Resort. Delta Sigma members Kennan Eaddy (President), Rhonda Hager (Past-President), and Kelton Stone Boorman (Vice President) were in attendance representing "the past, present, and future" leadership of our chapter. They were actively involved as volunteers, greeters, presenters, leaders, and participants.

Friday morning, Rhonda volunteered to assist with the convention project by working at the MANNA FoodBank for three hours. Rhonda shared, "This experience was so insightful to see the inner workings of a large food bank operation. My group sorted through boxes of donated green peppers to redistribute. One of MANNA's goals is to get fresh produce to folks, and it requires a tight turnaround time to get the food utilized while it is still usable. The sorting of all kinds of sizes, shapes, colors, and conditions of green peppers was very hands-on and our group was able to get many boxes ready to go out that morning to places that could utilize the fresh produce." MANNA works to end food insecurity in the mountains of Western North Carolina. NC DKG members contributed \$983 to support the FoodBank.

The Opening General Meeting Friday evening focused on chapter and member awards. According to Kelton, "It was wonderful seeing all the members of DKG



being honored for their commitment and hard work within their regions." Delta Sigma was recognized by the Communications and Marketing Committee for Communications Excellence. This award encompasses both newsletter and website excellence. The Awards Committee also announced Chapter Achievement Awards.



Delta Sigma was named a Superior Chapter.

The opening meeting also provided a unique experience for Kelton. She reported, "At the beginning of 2020, I was awarded the Don and Maxine McCall Endowment Fine Arts Grant through NC DKG. Maxine McCall spoke at the opening meeting, and afterward, I was able to introduce myself and express to her my gratitude. She was curious about what I had done with the grant. I was able to tell her where her grant had been applied in my elementary music classroom. That was a true HIGHLIGHT of my trip."

Saturday was a very full day of convention activities including the NC DKG Education Foundation Annual Meeting, Second General Session, 24 breakout sessions, and an evening banquet honoring chapter presidents.

Rhonda and Kelton volunteered to serve boxed lunches. During this time, Kelton reconnected with a former teacher and principal from her time in elementary and middle school in Cleveland County. "They were excited to see a former



student of theirs in DKG and education," Kelton stated. Rhonda also volunteered to serve as a greeter at several sessions.

Kennan and Rhonda presented a small group session on the career development emphasis Lincoln County Schools has embraced. They reviewed the importance of a systematic intentional approach county-wide for career development beginning in elementary school and explored many specific examples from Lincoln County. In elementary school they looked at GEMS club (Girls Exceeding in Math and Science), career fairs, field trips, and career research projects.

In middle school, they looked at career camps, Gaston College Tours and the Major Clarity career and college readiness platform. They also explored the relationship of Lincoln County Schools and Gaston College for high school students who are preparing for a career or college transfer. The session concluded with great conversation and feedback from the attending members.

Rhonda also attended a Regional Directors meeting Saturday afternoon where outgoing directors met with incoming directors and shared information. She conveyed with enthusiasm, "The convention was so much fun seeing folks in person after two years of not having a convention."

Sunday morning, the

Ceremony of Remembrance honored 52 sisters with white roses. The Convention Chorus also performed at this event.

The conference concluded with the 88th Annual Birthday Brunch celebrating both founders and members. Attendees were involved in a Founders Activity reflecting on the bios of four of the twelve founding members of DKG. In addition, twenty-one members were recognized and presented "Milestones of Membership" framed certificates, including the appropriate DKG service pin from five to 45 years.

Kennan shared the following comments about her conference experience. "If you've never been to a NC DKG conference, I would recommend you consider it next year. I find it unique because breakout sessions include presentations on society business, professional learning, and personal growth. This year I was able to attend a session on developing a chapter newsletter, present a session on K-12 career development, and then attend a session on healthy eating.

The newsletter session was very helpful in beginning the transition process to being the next newsletter editor, although I'm not sure there is any magic session that will help me fill Elaine Boysworth's very giant shoes!

For our professional session, we gave very specific examples of career development activities that members could take back to their chapters and districts. And while I didn't expect to learn much at all from the healthy eating session, it actually caused me to change the schedule and contents of my meals and snacks! Much like our Delta Sigma meetings, the fellowship and camaraderie at the conference is next to none.

During the banquet, we sat in regions and I had to eat dinner with seven people I had never met before (my worst nightmare)! By the time the salad course was finished, I had discovered direct connections with five out of my seven tablemates! It was the ultimate 'it's a small world' moment! The conference is really something that everyone should experience once in their DKG membership!"

As a first time convention attendee, Kelton reflected, "My favorite part was seeing WOMEN educators of all shapes, sizes, unique attributes, walks of life, and backgrounds being brought together for the benefit of ALL forms of education in NC. It was amazing to hear stories from them and learn how different we MAY seem to appear while connecting the common likenesses we share, which bond all of us deeper in DKG."

The 2022 NC DKG Convention definitely embraced President Winstead's theme "Linking the Past, Present and Future" in a myriad of ways.

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The convention chorus, led by Dr. Rhonda Hager and accompanied by Edie Snider, performed during the Presidents Banquet and the Ceremony of Remembrance.


