Constitution? Bylaws? Rules?

Do the terms *Constitution*, *Bylaws* and *Rules* confuse you? Do you know when it is possible to amend or make incremental changes to these governing documents?

The *Constitution* is one of DKG's governing documents at the International level. The *Constitution* is subject to proposals to amend every four years— in evennumbered years. The North Carolina state organization governing documents are aligned with the *Constitution*. Eta State *Bylaws* are open to amendment every two years— in odd-numbered years. At the chapter level in DKG, the governing document for the chapter is referred to as "*Rules*." Within its chapter rules, each DKG chapter identifies the amendment process and how often proposals to amend are possible.

Standing Rules are also governing documents at the international and state organization levels; these provide details for carrying out the mandates of the *Constitution* and state organization bylaws. The *International Standing Rules* are open to amendment every two years—at each International convention. At the North Carolina state organization level, the *Standing Rules* are open for amendment each year at convention. Now is the time for proposals to amend the Eta State *Standing Rules*. The form for submitting proposed amendments is online at

It Bears Repeating – DKG Scholarship Applications Online

For those of you working on advanced degrees, consider this opportunity!



The new DKG International Scholarship application for the 2018-2019 academic year is available on the Forms <u>tab</u> of the International website. You will need to be logged in to access it.

Scholarships are available to members who are pursuing doctoral, masters, and other advanced degrees in their field of study—\$6,000 for advanced degrees and \$10,000 toward a doctoral degree.

Members are encouraged to start filling out an application a few months before the next due date, as it will take some careful thought and planning to complete the application packet and collect other required academic documentation.

The deadline is **February 1, 2018** to submit the application and all supporting documentation. Be sure to follow the directions carefully and complete all sections of the application.

- Check your electric water heater. It is the secondlargest energy expense in your home. Therefore, saving water means saving energy and \$\$\$. Visit https://www.duke-energy.com/home/products/savewater.
 - See if you qualify for a free "Save Energy and Water Kit".
 - Install the FREE items and start saving water, energy and \$\$\$.

Water Conservation Facts and Tips

- ✓ Nearly 22% of indoor home water use comes from doing laundry. Save water by making sure to adjust the settings on your machine to the proper load size.
- ✓ Using a dishwasher is actually more water efficient than hand washing, especially if you run full loads. Dishwashers use 4-6 gallons of water. Washing by hand generally uses about 20 gallons per time.

- ✓ If you use a low-flow showerhead, you can save 15 gallons of water during a 10-minute shower.
- ✓ It takes about 70 gallons of water to fill a bathtub, so showers are generally the more water-efficient way to bathe.
- ✓ Every time you shave minutes off your use of hot water, you also save energy and keep dollars in your pocket.

Many important educationrelated issues will be considered during the "short session" of the General Assembly. Chapter members are asked to develop relationships with Senators and Representatives who are currently back home in their districts. School issues you might discuss are testing, class size, vouchers, educator salaries and benefits, teacher shortages, equal accountability of any and all schools that receive taxpayer dollars, etc. (See list of Eta State legislative priorities outlined in the September issue of Delta Sigma LINC.) Susan Phipps indicates that preparing now is important for DKG members to be "ready next spring, no matter what Raleigh has in store for us!"

Delta Sigma Provides Service to the Community and SUFC

Speak Up For Children, Inc. is pleased to announce that again this year Delta Sigma will assist the non-profit with the upcoming **Holiday Tour of Homes**. The tour will be held on <u>Friday, December 15, 2017 from 4:00</u> <u>p.m. until 9:00 p.m.</u> The Delta Sigma volunteers make the tour possible by greeting guests and monitoring the rooms to which they are assigned. They can sign up for one shift and take the rest of the time to visit the other homes on the tour.

As Christmas nears, the rich history, architecture and charm of Lincolnton will be showcased in this tour which will feature four lovely private homes and a historic church, all exquisitely decorated for Christmas. Visitors will tour The Hoke-Rhyne House and the Peacock Hill Farm, both overlooking the historic Laboratory Mill. They will tour the Self-Abernethy home and the private home of Mary Frances White at Ebony and White Funeral Services. Emanuel Lutheran Church will also be part of the tour.

This Holiday Tour of Homes offers a rare opportunity to enter some of Lincolnton's finest private homes and historic church facilities. Visitors will experience the architecture, furnishings, and holiday decorations that make these treasured sites unique. These properties help preserve the character and charm of historic Lincolnton. The tour is self-guided. Guests may visit any of the sites in any order at their own pace during the time allotted. Parking will be available near each of the homes. Tickets for the tour are \$20.00 (\$15.00, if purchased in advance). Tickets are available now at <u>www.speakupforchildren.us</u> or at The Cultural Center, 7th Moon Boutique, Amy's Closet in Denver, and Home Place Restaurant beginning November 15th.

Each year dozens of Lincoln County's children are removed from their homes and placed under Department of Social Services (DSS) custody as a result of abuse or neglect. Each child is assigned a volunteer advocate by the court called a Guardian ad Litem (GAL). In Lincoln County GALs advocate for over 100 children at any one time. These children often have many unmet needs such as clothes, shoes and help with school related activities and opportunities that are available to other children.

Speak Up For Children (SUFC), organized by the GALs, is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization registered in North

Carolina. SUFC raises funds and solicits in-kind donations to provide opportunities and to fill unmet material needs for these children, thus providing hope and a sense of normalcy in their disrupted lives. We also support the Guardian ad Litem program by assisting in volunteer recruitment and on-going training. Proceeds from this tour will go directly to provide for the foster children of Lincoln County.
