

Wanda loves working in the yard with her flowers and shrubs, canning, freezing, reading, supporting her grandchildren in all of their activities, and riding a 4-



wheeler – yes, a 4-wheeler! These are just a few of the hobbies and activities she enjoys in retirement. Wanda's love of canning combined with her husband's passion for gardening keeps her extremely busy during the growing season. Even though she gives most of her canned goods away, she absolutely loves canning items such as tomato juice, pickles, watermelon rind pickles, pickled okra, beets, salsa, grape jelly, and now pepper jelly, thanks to fellow Delta Sigma member Nelva Goodson. This summer, Wanda invited Nelva over to make her pepper jelly. She LOVES Nelva's pepper jelly, and only one jar a year was "just not enough!" She also freezes corn, blueberries, strawberries, and okra, to name a few.

and mature, regardless of how time consuming their activities may be. The message written on a banner that hung in Wanda's classroom read, "A hundred years from now it will not matter what my bank account was, the sort of house I lived in, or the kind of car I drove...but the world may be a better place because I was important in the life of a child." It is still applicable to Wanda's life, even in retirement.

After attaining a B.A. in Elementary Education at Lenoir-Rhyne, Wanda accepted her first teaching position as a Title I teacher at Westmont Elementary, the same school where she completed her student teaching. Two years later, she accepted a third grade position at Jenkins Elementary. She loved her two years at Jenkins, despite having 33 - 40 students in a class, because everyone worked and planned together.

With the birth of her first child, Wanda took a year off. She did not plan to return to work until their home in Lincoln County was completed, but was convinced to accept a job at Park Elementary in Lincolnton City Schools. She later had her second child and made a move to Oaklawn Elementary. Wanda's longest teaching stint was 12 years as a kindergarten and first grade teacher at Asbury Elementary School. Over the years she worked for several principals at Asbury, including Becky Heavner and also completed her master's degree in Growth and Human Development at UNCC. When the district decided to hire assistant principals at elementary schools, she missed the opportunity to apply for Becky's assistant principal position at Battleground because she lacked the administrative certification. She promptly returned to UNCC to add on her principal certification!

Wanda's administrative experience began as assistant principal at S. Ray Lowder. After serving three years, she spent another three years as assistant principal at Love Memorial. Wanda returned to S. Ray Lowder as

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principal for three more years, before beginning her final two years as principal at Union Elementary. Upon the birth of her first grandchild, Wanda decided to retire.

In the years following retirement, Wanda was asked to serve in several interim positions – assistant principal at ELMS, WLMS, and PCMS; principal at WLMS and Battleground; and as a Pre-School Coordinator for the district. She has been in high demand because of her knowledge and leadership abilities. Regarding her career, Wanda proclaims, "I've loved it all!"

Wanda has been an active member of Delta Kappa Gamma for 35 years, joining in 1986. She was aware of DKG through colleagues and friends and she was honored to be asked to join the Beta Epsilon chapter. She later served as president and also served on the state membership committee. It was during this time that the seed of change took root and plans to start a new chapter in Lincoln County sprouted. Wanda shared, "It was the best thing that could have happened."

Wanda has greatly enjoyed her membership in DKG and interacting with other educators. She believes it has extended her career into retirement. "I love the contact with adults with the same interest." She continues to learn new things from both working and retired members. She especially enjoys the service activities of Delta Sigma – providing scholarships and supporting new teachers.

Wanda's advice to new members is to mark your calendar and choose to attend chapter meetings! She says DKG is like any other activity, you get out of it what you put into it. Wanda also recommends attending state conferences and participating in DKG activities outside the



normal chapter meetings; they have enriched her life. State conferences provide the opportunity to network with educators from other school districts. caring friend, dedicated church member, and a much loved and devoted teacher. After graduation from Lenoir-Rhyne College, Becky began her thirty-five year teaching career at North Brook Elementary School. She also taught at Asbury Elementary and S. Ray Lowder Elementary. In addition, she assisted other teachers by working for three years at the Teachers' Learning Center. Missing her direct contact with students, Becky returned to S. Ray Lowder to conclude her teaching career.

Becky served Pleasant Grove United Methodist Church for many years as treasurer and organist/pianist. She was very



community-minded. Her interest in the cultural development of her fifth graders led her to serve many years on the Lincoln County chapter of the NC Symphony Board to bring the symphony experience to the Lincoln County Schools.

In addition to her work in the LCS, Becky was a teacher of ceramics for Gaston College for twenty-five years. Judy Jones began her tribute by showing a ceramic owl she made in 1975 in one of Becky's ceramic classes. Judy and Becky were distant cousins, on their maternal side, who shared a love of the Hoyle family genealogy and the Hoyle family reunions. Judy included a tradition from those reunions, lighting of a white candle for Becky and singing "Where We'll Never Grow Old."

President Eaddy presented a white rose to Rondel during the final responsive reading, "One White Rose." Membership chair, Rhonda Hager, and Cindy White also participated in the program. Becky Burke's beautiful smile and love of people is a legacy that will live on in the hearts of all who knew her.


connections with members across the state and is offering everyone the unique opportunity to network and connect by volunteering behind the scenes this year.


Celebrate a Teacher Continues

Technology Tip

Update Your MyDKG Profile

Fall is a great time to update your MyDKG Profile on the international website to be sure it is up to date. Many members may have retired or changed schools or have never added their profile to the database. Follow these simple steps to update your profile:

- Visit and log on to the DKG website.
- Click "My DKG" on the right side (top menu bar).
- Open "DKG Profile" (left side).
- Update or complete the "About Me" information and save it.
- Click the "My Participation" tab, scroll down to "Communication Preferences" and click "Yes, include my DKG Profile in the Online Directory" and click Save again. (It is safe and secure, and only fellow DKG members will see it. Note: Only the month and day will be shown on birthdate)

If you have never logged on to the DKG website or do not remember your password, clicking the Chat feature is the easiest way to get it.
