Assistant Superintendent Aaron Allen welcomed everyone and thanked Delta Sigma members for our continued interest in nurturing and mentoring first year teachers.



Laurie Sellers and Katie Crocker facilitated the

session by involving everyone in two "get acquainted" activities. Laurie then introduced a panel of chapter members that included Samantha Campbell, Katie Crocker, Rhonda Hager, Kesha Ruppe, and Darla Stines. Panel members shared



their best advice for first year teachers that included the areas of curriculum planning, classroom management, and ways to seek support. The panel also involved new teachers in a question and answer session.

Each new teacher received a "crate" of gifts and supplies to assist them during the first year of teaching. Delta Sigma members will continue to mentor these new teachers throughout the year. INSIGNIA Each member has a *key pin* that she may wear wherever and whenever she chooses. Wearing the pin at all DKG meetings is encouraged. The *Cup* is for scholarship, and the *Laurel Leaves* signify achievement. The *Crest* contains elements for which we are known—the *Lamp* for knowledge, the *Laurel Leaves* for achievement, the *Open Book* for scholarship, and the *Roses* for the Society. Modern Logos: The red rose is designed for the 21st century to indicate that we meet the needs of modern women educators. "*DKG*" are the letters of our official name and stress that we are a professional organization not a social one. The words "*International Society for Key Women Educators*" helps place us as a global organization, not limited to one country.

TRADITION and CHANGE provide a richness and comfort to many members even as we move forward in the 21st century. While none of the traditions are obligatory, many members feel in them a part of what makes for chapter success. The Delta Kappa Gamma Song is often the most visible "tie that binds" us together. Celebration of Life pays tribute to newly deceased members in "genuine spiritual fellowship" recognizing their service to education and to the society. Initiation and Installation Ceremonies provide visual and moving symbols of change and new beginnings. Birthday Celebrations for chapters, state organizations and the international society are encouraged. Finally, Social Events offer additional opportunities to network and foster the genuine spiritual fellowship for which we are known. While they should not outweigh the professional purpose of the organization, they do bind us together in friendship.

Irina Ushakova Visits Region X

On August 8, 2016, Edwina Beam, Libby Fletcher, and Rhonda Hager traveled to Morganton, NC to meet with fellow DKG members from Region X and hear speaker Irina Ushakova from Turkmenistan. The event was hosted by the Alpha Nu Chapter and our sisters were

greeted by Amy Vaughn who was Rhonda Hager's former college roommate. We do live in a small world!

Amy shared her experiences with hosting Irina through a National Program called Project TEA (Teaching Excellence and Achievement Program). This exchange program is supported and sponsored by the US Cultural Affair's department. It gives foreign educators an opportunity to visit in the US and US educators the opportunity to visit other countries to gain insight into education programs and systems around the world. Amy has been privileged to work with Irina since 2012 to support teachers in her country. Alpha Nu adopted Irina as an honorary sister and has been assisting her in various ways.

The country of Turkmenistan is north of Iran and Afghanistan, and it is government controlled. Teachers must buy all their own school supplies for students and use their own money to contribute to whatever the government instructs the teachers to do. For example, teachers are required to make personal monetary contributions to the Red Cross, but Irina had no idea what the Red Cross organization did. In addition, the government purchased SMART boards for "show" to the citizens; however, there are no computers for teachers, no funds for replacement bulbs or repairs, and no training for teachers. Therefore, the technology often goes unused. Teacher leaders like Irina work with the US to secure materials and funds to provide a quality education for their students. This is risky work. Irina and others must be creative in order to get materials into the teachers' hands.

Amy had the opportunity to visit Irina in Turkmenistan. She witnessed citizens live in fear of the Turkmenistan government who censors their personal mail and communications. Furthermore, the government confiscates materials and supplies from individuals going in and out of the country. Irina's visa has been pulled on several occasions and she was not allow to

travel. On one occasion, Irina was traveling to the US to see her daughter graduate from college and the government did not allow her to leave. Unfortunately, she missed this special day with her daughter.

Members Visit General Assembly

On June 21st, Kennan Eaddy and Elaine Jenkins met other DKG members from around the state at the North Carolina General Assembly in Raleigh. The purpose of the visit was to meet with legislators to share our Eta State's priorities. Both Jason Saine and David Curtis were unavailable to meet, so Kennan and Elaine joined other members in conversation with their representatives.



The reception to the DKG presentations was generally warm. At the time of this visit, the budget had not been finalized, but most legislators hinted at a possible increase in pay for teachers. There was also significant discussion on the issue of poverty in schools, and Kennan offered some insights into research on the effects of poverty on children.

This visit underscored the value in candid conversation with decision-makers. With so much at stake for the state's children, DKG members need to express their concerns professionally but firmly! Please see Kennan or Elaine if you are interested in participating in the future.
