DKG was founded by Dr. Annie Blanton and eleven other educators to support women educators and education. The founders wanted "us" to be a driving force in the field of education, changing as the needs and the world changed. As an organization, we strive to support one another personally and professionally as well as supporting non-member educators. We want to build excellence in education through programs and projects. If our Founders were in attendance at our meetings today, wouldn't they be proud of what we are achieving for women educators and education?

DKG gives approximately \$3,000,000 to members and non-members through chapter, state organizations and international scholarships and grants each year. At all levels, the Society works through UNICEF to support the "Schools for Africa" project.

DKG is structured into five regions – **Europe, Northeast** which includes some Canadian provinces and Puerto Rico, **Northwest** which also includes some Canadian provinces, **Southeast**, and **Southwest** which includes Central America, Japan and Mexico. There are 78 state organizations and more that 2300 chapters in 17 countries. The international offices are in Austin, Texas, because that is where the organization was founded in 1929

As a member of DKG, you belong to a chapter, **Delta Sigma**, a region, **X**, a state organization, **Eta State**, and an international society, **DKG**. The benefits of membership are networking, scholarships and grants, publications, conferences, conventions, and seminars. 2015 State Leadership Development Seminar:

Cultivating Women Educators for Leadership

Over the summer I had the privilege to attend the Eta State Leadership Development Seminar held at William Peace University in Raleigh. The format for the four days was a combination of large group sessions dealing with topics on Courageous Leadership, How to Communicate Effective, Service Projects, Fiscal Fitness, Taking Care of Your Whole Self, Technology Tools, then followed by small group sessions where participants were allowed to select sessions of interest. The range of sessions provided information for all educators from beginning teachers to retired personnel. Our own Dr. Elaine Jenkins led a session entitled, "A Review of Education Legislation in NC" giving insight

into educational issues.

Besides the informative sessions, I really enjoyed the networking with other DKG sisters from across the state and spending time together as fellow educators. Many times we are all so busy that we fail to take the time to fellowship and spend

quality time talking as women educators. One of my highlights was hearing Dr. Barbara Day who was a former college professor of mine at UNC-Chapel Hill speak on finding balance in your life. I left Peace University feeling energized and renewed and grateful for the opportunity to grow professionally with other women

Elementary and Secondary Education Act Update

The U.S. Congress is taking up the reauthorization of the former ESEA legislation. The Senate version is entitled, "Every Child Achieves Act of 2015" (S.1177). This Bill maintains the testing of No Child Left Behind and allows states to create their own accountability system, does not allow Title I funds for low income students to follow the student to other public or private schools of their choice, reinstates the 21st century community learning centers (after school programs), requires states to identify low performing schools, and increases the number of school counselors and social workers. The House version is entitled "Student Success Act," (H.R.5). It retains testing in grades 3-8 and high school, eliminates AYP. It requires reporting by high schools on the high

school graduation rate. It limits charter school grants to no more than 5 years. If passed, it would make states and districts ineligible for federal funding if personnel hired refused to submit to a background check. This indicates that schools should conduct a criminal background check on each individual when hiring personnel.

The Social Security Expansion Act (S.743) would use the Consumer Price Index to calculate the cost of living increases in social security payments. It would extend to tax earners making more than \$250,000 annually. It would increase the average annual benefit to about \$800 a year or \$65 per month. It would not take place until 2021 if passed.

There are currently two bills which could provide tax relief for educators. The Education Tax Relief Act of 2015 (H.R. 29400) would make professional development expenses tax deductible. The Tax Relief Extension Act of 2015 (S. 1946) has been introduced, but no summary of the provisions of this bill are available at this time. It would possibly extend tax deductions for educators which expired in 2014.
