Rhonda Hager started the meeting at 5:00 to welcome us and let us know about the angels that were available for seniors to be taken by members. She then turned it over to Heather Myers to introduce our guest speaker for the evening. She opened with a quote, "Technology is just a tool. In terms of getting the kids working together and motivating them, the teacher is the most important." Bill Gates

Steven Hoyle has been in IT for 27 years. He is from a family of educators and is married to a 2nd grade teacher. He opened with prayer. Cyber security was the topic of the day.

People think things won't happen in our neighborhood. But all stories told today would come from close by. He asked us to rate our knowledge of cyber security on a scale of 1-10 and discuss why with our tables. We then were asked to share with the group. Some said their ratings were low because we are a trusting people and want to believe in people. Technology is a part of everything we do so we need to make cyber security a part of everything we do. It has to be ongoing.

He asked if we knew of any organizations who had been hacked recently. Gaston College, United Bank, CPCC, Lenoir Rhyne University, CVCC, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, the Oil Pipeline, even a hospital had been hacked in the last few years. He reviewed some of the cyber security facts he gave us. Stating that 90% of all data breaches were the result of human error. He then asked what were we most scared of with a data breach—losing money, identity theft, credit issues, but most importantly what would happen to our children. He then reviewed the 8 cyber security facts that pertained specifically to children.

He then asked us to play 2 truths and a lie with someone we knew at our table. It was stated that the more we know about someone, the easier it is to fool them into doing something. This is social engineering. People who practice social engineering will use all they know about you and use it against you. They will take all the information you put out about yourself and use it. They use the shame and guilt against you and then you don't tell it. Don't hide. If you don't say anything and you are ashamed, you are the most vulnerable. We have to raise awareness.

Phishing–fishing for your information. That post on Facebook that asks the 20 questions about your favorite color, flower, city, etc, and then asks you to pass it on...your information is being gathered. Don't do it. Sometimes this comes in the form of an email.

Malware-software with malicious intent

Ransomware—they hold your data until you pay a ransom.

Protection and Awareness–Students know to use technology, but they don't have life experiences. We are all people of influence in schools and churches. We need to know about people and be trained. Safe gatherings is an app/website that has modules and training online, does background checks, trains on what to look for in abused children

We have to learn to question when things don't seem right. We should initiate contact. If we get a call or email or text asking us for our card number, social security number or account number to verify because it is being hacked, we should not answer these questions. They will appear to get more pushy and try to scare us into answering. If you are concerned, hang up and call your bank or card company on a number you know and trust. They will never call you first. When it comes to purchases, use BBB, background checks, buy local, use big store accounts, or use safe paper methods or disposable credit cards if you're suspicious.

He discussed ID lock. These basically monitor your credit report, and only tell you if credit was applied for. It locks your account, so new credit is applied for. It does not tell you if your bank account is drained or if your credit card bill is charged up.

When, not if, something happens, respond immediately. Beware of someone who is dismissive when you report it. Call back and ask for someone else. Don't let fear or shame cause you more pain. Shine a light in the darkness. Ask questions.
