Delta Kappa Gamma Eta State Education Law and Policy Committee Protocol for Political Contacts

Participation in the political process is both a right and a responsibility. As Eta State seeks to influence legislative decisions at local, state, and national levels, it is important that we acknowledge the purposes of our society and the dignity of our profession. With this purpose in mind, members are asked respectfully to remember the following guidelines:

- All Eta State communications with legislators and staff will be cordial and professional.
- When representing DKG, members will confine remarks to the issues identified by the membership. Other issues may be addressed at a different time as individuals or members of another group.
- DKG members will educate themselves on the specific legislation/policy to be addressed as well as appropriate background to support our position.
- All letters to the editor addressed to local newspapers/news sources will be submitted after the approval of the local chapter.
 - It is suggested that all letters be reviewed by at an additional reader.
- In order to reassure members, chapters may prefer that all Letters to the Editor be signed by retired members.
 - Copies of all letters to the editor will be sent to the Eta State President.
- When attending meetings with office holders either locally or in their legislative offices, DKG members will wear their membership pins.
- All emails regarding political activity will be sent to members' personal email addresses and not to email addresses asso-

News from International: Applications Ready for 50th Anniversary Awards

The Educational Foundation is offering 50 \$1,000 project awards to mark its Fiftieth Anniversary. Awards will fund individual classroom, school and community based projects involving learners in an educational environment. Eligible projects will begin after July 2014 and be completed by the end of the 2014-2015 school year. Classroom or art supplies, books, computer software and field trips are examples of eligible projects. Awards may not be used for salaries. Continued on page 4

hat In the orld is orld Fellowships?

On occasion as DKG members we have been asked to contribute spare change or dollars to support World Fellowships. Have you caught yourself wondering what this is? It is in fact another way that DKG internationally helps to support women educators in the advancement of their education.

The World Fellowships Program began at the 1946 convention in San Francisco with the approval of a project aimed to aid women in war-torn countries. Four German women educators, with financial assistance from DKG members, spent eight weeks of study and visitation in Sweden in the spring of 1948.

The second step toward the present-day World Fellowships Program was the alliance in 1952 with UNESCO (United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization) to provide special help for Korean women. During 1958-1960, the present program began to take shape, and an agreement was made with the Institute of International Education (IIE) to provide dossiers from which a Society committee could select recipients for study in the U.S.

Work with World Fellowships was the province of the Personal Growth & Service Committee. In 1972, the World Fellowships Committee became a standing committee, with state and chapter committees added to the DKG Constitution in 1974.

In 1978, the Institute of International Education recognized the World Fellowships Program with an award, which is displayed at DKG International Headquarters.

Through the years the program has grown and to date a total of 555 women from 101 countries have received fellowships to enable them to pursue advanced study in the U.S. and Canada.

From my first introduction to **Dr. Elaine Boysworth**, I was extremely impressed with her knowledge, her enthusiasm, and her creative ideas. At that time she was Lead Instructional Specialist for the Southwest Regional Education Center for DPI. During our training for the transition to Block Scheduling, Elaine gave me many ideas and activities that I used through the end of my career. Needless to say, I was thrilled when she made Lincoln County Schools her home in 1994. She is presently the Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instructions. Dr. Boysworth has been in education for 35 years. Among her accolades is the S. Elaine Boysworth Distinguished Service Award. She was the first recipient and namesake of the award given by the North Carolina Middle School Association. Her professional activities, presentations, and associations are numerous and impressive.
